04.to act the part or character of in real life:

to play the fool; to play God.

05.to give performances in, as a theatrical company does:

to play the larger cities.

06.to engage in (a game, pastime, etc.).

07.to contend against in a game.

verb (used without object)

08.to exercise or employ oneself in diversion, amusement, or recreation.

09.to do something in sport that is not to be taken seriously.
